Mayor's Veto of Zoning Change Stands: Municipal Salary Ordinance Introduced

At its May 10 regular meeting the Borough Council did not attempt to override Mayor Leon Barth's veto of an ordinance that would have changed the zoning of an eight-acre strip of land along North Valley Road from residential to agricultural.

Council Member Lou Esakoff commented that he would have moved for an override vote if he thought enough Council members in attendance would vote for the override. Four votes would have been required to override the veto.

An ordinance fixing the salaries of Borough employees passed unanimously on first reading. The proposed ordinance fixes salaries as follows:

Borough Clerk (Elizabeth Johnson) \$3000, Borough Treasurer (Howard Prezant) \$1200, Tax Collector (Louise Prezant) \$3000, Tax Assessor (Michael Ticktin) \$1050;

Also, Librarian (Dottie Beinin) \$490, Municipal Court Judge (Kenneth R. Smith, Jr.) \$525, Municipal Court Clerk (Marie Ugi) \$400, Building Inspector (Peter Berlinrut) \$450, Zoning Officer (Berlinrut) \$150;

Also, Supt. of Public Works (Johnson) \$8000, Supt. of Water & Sewer Utilities (Licensed operators are firm of Kowalski & Chmiel) \$8000, Water & Sewer Treasurer (H. Prezant) \$800 and Water & Sewer Collector (Jacob Blutstein) \$945. The Council will hold a public hearing on the ordinance at its regular meeting on June 14.

In response to a letter from P.T.A. Corresponding Secretary Naomi Brahinsky, the Council voted to increase its contribution to the Fourth of July celebration from \$630 to \$800. Brahinsky wrote that the P.T.A. might not be able to cover the anticipated \$1,400 cost of the annual event without a larger grant from the Council.

No one seconded Council Member Art Shapiro's motion to increase the Council contribution to \$1,000. Ted Marton, Esther Pogrebin and Shapiro voted in favor of Marton's motion to provide \$800. Lou Esakoff and Arnold Sokolow voted against the increase.

The Council unanimously voted to break a tie bid and to award the contract to grade and gravel a parking lot for the Borough Hall to Hendrickson Excavating at a cost of \$1,400.

An ordinance giving the Board of Park Commissioners all of the powers of a Shade Tree Commission and a Board of Recreation Commissioners passed unanimously after a final reading. Park Commissioner Peter Berlinrut explained that the ordinance allows the Board to acquire and maintain parkland, among other powers.

The Council unanimously approved the appointments of John Blair and Joe Maldera to be, respectively, Chief and

School Board Accepts Cox-Shahn Gift

The Board of Education May 9 heard correspondence from Bernarda Shahn regarding a fund which her late husband established after the death of Dr. Harold Cox, many years ago. Originally, this money funded an annual history prize. But the Board decided not to continue the practice of giving awards to individual pupils, so the fund has been gathering interest since about 1970.

It has now been disbursed, with half going to Hightstown High School and the other half, \$567, to Roosevelt School. Mrs. Shahn expressed hope that the money would be used to purchase art and history material for the school library.

The proposed 1978-79 school calendar, which included an early closing in January for Humanitarian Day was amended pending staff approval. This was changed to a full school day, during which national heroes such as Martin Luther King and Franklin Delano Roosevelt could be honored in school programs.

The Board decided to allow people from the Monmouth County Association of Teen Awareness to come into the school and carry out a survey among the students in grades six, seven and eight. By analyzing the data from this anonymous survey, which asks about drugs, free time and general habits, and by observation and interaction with the teen population, the association can assess and recommend ways to deal with the vandalism problem which has been occurring on school grounds.

In other business, the Board heard a

report regarding a notice of impasse which has been filed with Public Employees Relations Commission (PERC) by the school staff citing salary disputes.

The Board allocated up to \$400 for purchase of fire-proof drapes for the lunch room, the only room presently without window shades. The school lunch equipment and the bright sun make some form of protection necessary.

Use of the school building by the summer program needs to be clarified, however, the Board voted approval for the use of leftover school supplies and materials for this program.

In his report, Principal Lew Gantwerk stated that the sixth, seventh and eighth grade camping trip was a great success. "It was a tough trip in terms of physical demands," he said. Plans will be underway soon for the October 1978 trip.

The Softball teams -- the Cardinals, the Roadrunners and the Roleers -- play at Millstone.



PRINCIPAL'S LETTER Students See Ballet, Visit Museums

Dear Friends,

As the school year draws to an end, we can look back on a number of satisfying and exciting experiences and look forward to a restful summer and another productive school year.

On Tuesday, May 23, we had a demonstration performance by six members of the Garden State Ballet Theater. They explained their training and demonstrated different steps and then performed excerpts from a number of ballets. All the children, K-8, were part of the audience. They all got involved with the performance and had a real close-up look at the ballet.

The third, fourth and fifth graders visited the Museum of Natural History in New York. They were particularly interested in the exhibits on the American Indians and the Eskimos since these were the cultures they had studied. The first and second graders visited Franklin Institute in Philadelphia on Monday, June 5.

Our May 12th "Come With Us" day was quite successful. The performances and classroom activities were well received by the children and the many guests who visited that day. The children here at school learned a great deal through their various projects.

We're involved in the State Educational Assessment Program. The tests were taken in April. The state sets minimal standards in the basic skills area. In reading a child must score 65% or better to be above minimum standards; in math, 75% or better. In our third grade, all of the students were above the minimum standards in

reading and all but two children were above in math. In our sixth grade, only two children were below the minimum standard in math and three below in reading. These results are encouraging, and our goal is to have all our students above the minimum standards set by the state.

We expect to receive the results of school-wide achievement tests sometime in June. The data will be analyzed and reported in this paper. Parents will have an opportunity to go over the results of their childrens' test with school officials.

Our eighth grade students have completed the orientation and freshman course selection process. A hearing date will be set June 12 to decide the future of our sending district relationship with Hightstown High School.

We received the videotape equipment purchased with the \$1,000 contribution by the P.T.A. This equipment has been used in the physical education classes, in the primary "project time," for rehearsals of our May 12 presentation and other events. It has been a significant addition to our program.

It has been a productive year at R. P. S. I'd like to take this opportunity to wish you all a restful and healthy summer.

Xerox had not taken advantage of the State Farmland Assessment Act, which significantly reduces the taxable value of qualified property in order to encourage retention of agricultural land.

The Millstone Township Planning Board granted approval of a five-lot residential subdivision on the D'Amico property at Ely's Corner.


The same planning board is considering a three-lot subdivision of the Philpot property, along Perrineville Road at Ely's Corner.





Vigiano, Weiner Win Democratic Primary; Counterman Accepts GOP Write-in Nomination

Marilyn Vigiano and Leslie Weiner 225 won the Democratic nod of approval for two Borough Council positions in the Primary Election on Tuesday, June 6, and write-in candidate Bill Counterman accepted the GOP nomination.

Democrats cast 146 votes Tuesday for Vigiano, 113 for Weiner, 62 for David Jones and 39 for Gary Maltby. Counterman got 90 Democratic write-in votes.

both Counterman and Jones got write-in votes on the Republican side, enabling them to run in the fall on the GOP ticket.

Jones said he is undecided about any November candidacy. He has until Tuesday to file his acceptance with

Monmouth County election officials.

Counterman has already filed his 1450 acceptance with the county. He got eight write-in votes in the Republican column on Tuesday.

Shirley Eichler was voted in as a member of the Republican Executive Committee of Monmouth County. Bulkin received the Democratic Executive Committeeman nomination. Esther Pogrebin and Freda Hepner each received three votes for Democratic Executive Committeewoman.

In a state race for the United States Senate, incumbent Clifford Case received 15 Roosevelt votes, while Jeff Bell received none. This was not representative of the whole state where Dell was GoP winner and Bill Bradley won the Democratic nomination.
