New Deputy Registrar and Tax Assessor Appointed; New Procedure for Reporting Alleged Zoning Violations Announced

At its June 13 meeting, the Borough Council adopted a resolution appointing Kathleen Hart to the position of Deputy Registrar of Vital Statistics, in which position she will serve as a back-up to Borough Clerk Krystyna Olejnik, who also serves as the Registrar. Ms. Hart is also the Registrar of Millstone Township. The position of Deputy Registrar was formerly held by Nancy Warnick, who did not accept reappointment because she had retired from her official positions in both Millstone and Roosevelt and recent interpretations issued by the Division of Pensions have the effect of prohibiting the re-employment of a pensioner in a position that he or she retired from, notwithstanding the fact that the law allows a pensioner to hold public employment paying not more than \$15,000.

At the same meeting, Mayor Beth Battel announced the appointment, subject to formal confirmation by the Council at its June 27 meeting, of Donna Taylor as the new municipal Tax Assessor. She is the Assistant Assessor of Upper Freehold, where she also serves as Chief Finance Officer. Once confirmed, she will replace Michael Ticktin, who retired from both State and

municipal service, effective June 1, and could not accept reappointment to the position of Tax Assessor for the same reason that Mrs. Warnick could not accept reappointment as Deputy Registrar. Mr. Ticktin was first appointed to the position of Tax Assessor by then-Mayor Bert Ellentuck on October 9, 1974, succeeding Jeanette Koffler. The only other person to serve as Tax Assessor was Leroy Levine, who served from the creation of the Borough of Jersey Homesteads in 1937 until he was succeeded by Mrs. Koffler in 1952.

In furtherance of the effort to resolve the status of the former gas station, the Council appropriated \$2,085.00 to pay the cost of ground water analysis, the one item that it was decided that the Borough would have to pay for at the meeting reported in last month's issue of the *Bulletin*.

In other business, Councilman Ralph Warnick reported that the bench in Jersey Homesteads Park, otherwise known as the Homestead/Valley Triangle, was repaired by Dave Parsons and is now back in place and that the benches on the School grounds facing the Post Office

and in Co-operative Circle Park, also known as the Pine/Tamara Triangle, would also be restored. He recommended that the Council consider various alternatives for replacing the bench at the Cemetery that was vandalized and expressed concern about spending money on a new bench that could be vandalized or stolen. He also called upon the Council to establish procedures to ensure proper maintenance of the Cemetery, noting that there has been some deterioration in conditions there of late.

Councilwoman Arlene Stinson announced that she had met with Zoning Officer Ralph Kirkland, who has prepared a form that is henceforth to be used by anyone filing a complaint alleging any zoning violation. The purpose of the form is to make sure that all information necessary for investigation and prosecution of any violation is provided. ■

Democrats Nominate Battel, Ellentuck and Atwood; No Republicans or Independents Nominated for Local Office.

On June 7, 49 Roosevelt residents cast their votes in the Democratic primary, resulting in the re-nomination of both Mayor Beth Battel and Councilman Jeff Ellentuck and the nomination of Bob Atwood for the Council position now held by Dan Hoffman. There was no opposition in the Democratic primary and there were neither any candidates for local office nor any votes cast in the Republican primary. Since no petitions were filed for any independent candidates on or before the date of the primary, the three local Democratic nominees will be unopposed on the ballot in the November election. ■

The training for May was splinting and bandaging.

## First Aid Squad History:

April 1974: The Squad started to arrange a party to celebrate the Squad 25 years of service. August 1974: Roy Terry, Dick Mellon and Elly Shapiro were voted into the Squad. October 1974: All members of the Squad received their new CPR cards. November 1974: Captain's Report states that the Squad responded to 6 calls. March 1975: Two new tires were put on the ambulance. April 1975: Tuesday nights were going to be the training nights.

## Health Notes:

### ANAPHYLAXIS

Anaphylaxis or anaphylactic shock occurs when the immune system reacts violently to a substance to which it has already been sensitized. Do not be misled by a patient who reports no history of allergic reaction to a substance on first or second exposure. Each exposure after sensitization tends to produce a more severe reaction.

Severe allergic reactions commonly follow exposure by one of these four routes.

- Injections (tetanus antitoxin, penicillin)
- Stings (honeybee, wasp, yellow jacket, hornet)
- Ingestion (shellfish, penicillin)
- Inhalation (dust, pollens)

Anaphylactic reactions can develop in minutes or even seconds after contact with the substance to which a patient is sensitized. The signs of such allergic reactions are distinct from those of other forms of shock.

### Signs and Symptoms of Anaphylactic Shock:

#### -Skin:

Flushing, itching, or burning, especially over the face and upper chest. Urticaria (hives), which may spread over large areas of the body.

Edema, especially of the face, tongue, and lips.

Cyanosis about the lips.

#### -Circulatory System:

Dilation of peripheral blood vessels.

A drop in blood pressure.

A weak, barely palpable pulse.

Pallor.

Dizziness, Fainting and coma

#### -Respiratory System:

Sneezing or itching in the nasal passages.

Tightness in the chest, with a persistent dry cough.

Wheezing and dyspnea.

Secretions of fluid and mucous into the bronchial passages, alveoli and lung tissue.

Bronchoconstriction; difficulty drawing air into the lungs.

Forced expiration, requiring exertion and accompanied by wheezing.

Respiratory arrest.

In anaphylactic shock, although there is no loss of blood, no vascular damage and only a slight possibility of direct cardiac muscular injury, the widespread vascular dilation cause poor oxygenation and poor perfusion that can easily prove fatal.

All the members of the First Aid Squad are trained yearly or receiving training now on how to administer auto-injectors with epinephrine. Both ambulances carry 2 adults and 1 child auto-injectors for anaphylactic shock.

There are still houses in town that either do not have house numbers or have numbers are too small to see from the street. Please check the numbers posted on your house to ensure that they are large and colorful enough so Emergency Services and State Police can see them from the road, especially at night.

**JULY**

The forecast from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Climate Prediction Center for the rest of summer, July and August, calls for equal chances of above normal or below average temperatures and precipitation in our area. However, most of the nation will have either cooler or warmer and more or less precipitation than average temperatures during that period. From the southwest through the southeast up through Delaware temperatures are expected to be above normal and rainfall below normal. The area from Northern California to the border with Canada then east to the Great Lakes and south to central Illinois is expected to be cooler and wetter than normal.

I hope we don't have a July like last year when record heat was measured in Newark. The city had four straight days of 100+ heat. July 2010 also brought the hottest weather since the Dust Bowl (1936) in Trenton. It was the hottest month all-time in Trenton, Atlantic City, Las Vegas, and Washington, D.C.

Looking back at May in Roosevelt we had yet another warmer than normal month. The average temperature for the whole month was 4.7 degrees Fahrenheit above the normal average temperature for May. That means four out of the first five months in 2011 had warmer than normal average temperatures. Precipitation was below normal, by about three quarters of an inch.

**Weather Word**

**MESOMAP**

Mesomap is a combination of the terms "mesonet" and "map".

In meteorology, "mesonet" is a network of weather stations used to monitor weather over a regional area. Such stations gather data like temperature, pressure, humidity, wind speed/direction, cloud conditions, and precipitation.

A "map" is a graphical representation of some area.

Thus, a weather mesomap is a graphical representation of observing stations (usually surface stations) designed to display regional scale weather information. This allows an observer to gain a perspective of weather phenomena otherwise unobtainable. ■

This is one of my favorite recipes from *The Moosewood Cookbook*. It's an Indonesian dish with lots of stir fried vegetables, rice, and tofu topped with gingery peanut sauce.

The recipe is very intensive with a lot of preparation work of chopping and dicing but it is SO well worth it! It also makes a bounty of food serving 6 or more, an ideal meal for a small gathering. I hope you try it and enjoy it!

## Gado-Gado

The ingredients can be stacked on a large platter or on individual plates.

- A bed of fresh spinach (and/or another fresh green such as kale or swiss chard) goes on the bottom.
- Yellow rice goes on top of the spinach. Place 2 cups rice in 3 cups boiling water. Once tender, add ½ tsp. turmeric to make the rice yellow.
- An assortment of vegetables go on next. Any and all kinds of veggies can be used such as: broccoli, green beans, peas, carrot, bok choy, peppers, shredded cabbage (red & green), bean sprouts, scallion, radish, etc. The veggies can be raw, slightly steamed, or cooked with a little oil. I prefer to use mostly raw with steamed carrots and broccoli.
- Pan fried tofu seasoned with soy sauce or tamari go on next. Substitute meat or hard boiled eggs if you wish.

- The Peanut sauce gets poured over everything next:

1 C creamy peanut butter  
 1 heaping T grated ginger  
 1 heaping T chopped garlic  
 1 T brown sugar  
 1 ½ C hot water  
 4 T cider vinegar  
 2 T soy sauce  
 1 tsp salt  
 Crushed red pepper to taste

- Put all ingredients in the blender and process until smooth. If too thick, add more water. The sauce should be watery and thin.

- Final Toppings:

2 T thin slices of fresh ginger  
 1 C chopped onion  
 12 garlic cloves, thinly sliced

- Saute each of the above in peanut or vegetable oil until cooked. Put each into small bowl and let each person garnish his or her own plate. ■

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
