## Election Nov. 4: Governor, Council, Assembly, Board of Ed, FDR Memorial Restoration

New Jersey's statewide election is set for Tuesday, November 4, although many voters may have already voted through mail-in ballots or early voting. On the ballot are statewide, county, and local offices: Governor and Lieutenant Governor, General Assembly, Sheriff, County Clerk, County Commissioners, Borough Council positions, and three slots for the Roosevelt Board of Education. Roosevelt residents will vote at Borough Hall on Election Day.

Also on the ballot are two Public Questions: a local Municipal Question providing a bond for the restoration of Roosevelt's Franklin Delano Roosevelt Amphitheater, which has fallen into disrepair; and a county-wide proposal to increase the allocation for the Monmouth County Open Space, Recreation, Floodplain Protection, and Farmland and Historical Preservation Trust Fund. Explanations for both of these questions can be found on the sample ballot, which will be received by most residents over the next week, and can also be viewed at Monmouth County Votes ([monmouthcountyvotes.gov](http://monmouthcountyvotes.gov)) the official web site of the Monmouth County Clerk's Election Division.

While most of the elected offices are contested, the Borough Board of Education election has no candidates on the ballot for its three open slots, inviting the possibility that up to three write-in candidates could be elected with a single vote each.

The Borough Council election includes three incumbents, Democrats Danelle Feigenbaum, Constance Herrstrom, and Claudia Luongo, and Republican challenger Bonnie Koury.

Approval of Roosevelt's Public Question providing for restoration of the FDR Amphitheater has been strongly

supported by The Fund for Roosevelt, a local non-profit that supports the preservation of open space and historic elements in the Borough (and of which this reporter is a member). The Fund, which advocates for approval of the bond, has previously committed over \$80,000 towards design and preliminary costs and raised over \$200,000 to minimize the financial impact on the Borough. As noted in the Interpretive Statement on the ballot, Monmouth County has also awarded Roosevelt an Open Space Grant of up to \$330,000 to support the project. Thus, of the requested bond authorization of \$676,000, approximately 80% has been funded outside of local taxes, significantly reducing the Borough's actual cost. As detailed in the Amphitheater Q & A (page 6), the actual cost is expected to be not more than \$550,000, further reducing the cost to Borough Taxpayers.

The Monmouth County Open Space Question affects the County's ongoing Open Space Trust Fund program. It would raise the annual collection rate for the Fund from 2.75 cents to 3.75 cents per \$100 of equalized property value. Increasing the rate is intended to enable the funding for open space acquisition to keep pace with rising land costs and with the loss of land to development.

The race for New Jersey Governor continues to be close, with recent polls from Fairleigh Dickinson University and Fox News showing a five to seven percentage point lead for Democratic Representative Mikie Sherrill over former Republican Assemblyman Jack Ciattarelli. Emerson College Polling showed a virtual tie as of late September, with each candidate polling at 43% and 11% of voters undecided. Two additional candidates, Libertarian Vic Kaplan and Socialist Workers Party candidate Joanne Kuniansky are also on the ballot.

## Art in the Woods

A walk through the Roosevelt woods is a pleasure any time of year—from watching plants come to life in the spring to following animal tracks after a snowfall. One of the most special days on the Ron Filip Trail is the annual RAP Art Walk, also known as Art in the Woods. This year's walk, held on October 5, was especially delightful, featuring many new artists and a wide variety of media and subject matter.

Led by local artist **Ellen Silverman**, with support from **Barbara Atwood** and **Cherie Chelst**, the community came together to share and enjoy the artwork of residents from Roosevelt and the surrounding area. Exhibits ranged from breathtaking wildlife photography by **Katerina Paleckova** to a spooky mural painted by this year's youngest participant, **Janik Stupak-James**—all arranged along the trail by the artists themselves. The musical contributions added even more color: the ukulele stylings of local favorite **Clover Balon**, and a found-art percussion installation by her mother **Gabriella Balon**, which invited attendees to try their hand at rhythm-making—perhaps discovering the next Tito Puente!

**Ron Kostar** led a lively group reading of selections from *Alice in Wonderland*, while poetry from local poets—including **Steven Ring**, **Dave Herrstrom**, and **Judith McNally**—was displayed on trees for passersby to enjoy.

The event also honored three local students—**Clover Balon**, **Yasmeen Atieh**, and **Kendall LaCompte**—who painted the new Little Free Libraries seen around town. ## Questions and Answers about the FDR Memorial Amphitheater

On Election Day, November 4, 2025, we (Roosevelt residents) will be voting on a public question regarding a bond issue for the restoration of the FDR Memorial Amphitheater, the seating area and sculpture of FDR adjacent to Roosevelt Public School on Rochdale Ave. The Fund for Roosevelt, a local non-profit that supports the preservation of open space and historic elements in the Borough, supports the bond issue, and has been working to minimize the cost of the restoration to Borough taxpayers. Here are responses to some of the questions that have come up.

**Why are residents being asked to vote on \$676,000 in bonds if the actual cost of restoration will be less than that?**

According to the law, the bond amount must cover the entire cost of the project. When the bond issue was approved by Council, the project was expected to be more expensive than it turned out to be. **The Borough will only issue bonds for the cost of the project, now projected to be significantly less, not the full amount authorized.**

**How much will the project actually cost?**

The total construction cost, based on a professional cost estimate, is anticipated to be under \$550,000. We won't know the exact cost until the project is put out to bid and the bids from contractors come in.

**How will it be paid for?**

Monmouth County has awarded a County Municipal Open Space grant to the Borough to pay half of the cost, up to a maximum of \$330,000. These

funds are firmly committed and have been set aside for this project. If the total cost is \$550,000, they will pay \$275,000.

In addition, The Fund for Roosevelt is committed to reducing or eliminating all cost to Borough taxpayers. **As of October 20, 2025, The Fund has secured \$200,000 in donations and pledges to offset the estimated total Borough share of \$275,000. We will continue to raise money through our fundraising campaign to make sure that the cost to Borough taxpayers is as low as possible – hopefully, there will be no cost to the taxpayers.**

**What is the worst case if the Fund for Roosevelt can't raise any more money?**

If the Fund for Roosevelt can't raise any more money, and the Borough must cover the remaining \$90,000 or so, that cost will translate into less than **\$2 per month** for each Roosevelt taxpayer.

**What happens if the bond issue isn't approved?**

If the bond is not approved, the FDR Memorial Amphitheater will continue to fall into disrepair. The deterioration of the Amphitheater cannot be fixed by patching, and it will eventually become unsafe. This year, due to the conditions at the amphitheater, Roosevelt Public School graduation had to be held on the handball court.

Without the bond approval, the Borough would lose up to \$330,000 in Monmouth County grant funds, as well as the \$88,700 already committed by the Fund for Roosevelt to cover design costs. More than \$200,000 in pledges and donations already collected by the Fund would be returned or cancelled.

Unless we act now to address the restoration, the Amphitheater may eventually have to be demolished at Borough expense, or surrounded with a chain link fence for safety and insurance reasons.

## RECIPES

### Instant Pot Chicken Soup or Chicken and Dumplings

I use my Instant Pot weekly. Contact me for lessons if yours is collecting dust.

1) Plug into an outlet where you won't be using anything else for a few hours. Certainly not the same outlet as microwave, toaster, or air fryer unless you live in a fancy Eleanor Drive house and not an original one.

2) Add about 6 cups of water and start the pot on sauté (this is just a speedy step).

3) I use a metal strainer/steam basket in the pot and add the chicken carcass; leftover chicken, any celery/onion/carrot/peppers. I use whole for flavor for dumplings. For soup I chop small first and then add outside of the basket. Sautéing first is not necessary. I also add Better Than Bullion seasoning.

4) Shut off sauté; cover with the lid making sure the pressure valve is in the Seal position. Turn on Soup mode for 90 minutes.

Walk way. Even with the preheating your water this will take 100 minutes or so and will keep warm for six hours after it's done.

If you are around, you'll hear a beep when it gets to pressure and the 90 minutes will count down

5) After 90 minutes, let it sit at least 15 minutes to let the pressure naturally release or you will have steaming hot soup spray up. I let it sit until dinner.

6) Release any pressure that's left. Remove bones. Soup!

To turn it into Chicken and Dumplings, remove bones and big veggies. Return broth to boil on sauté. Drop in dumplings (I use Bisquick) boil 10 minutes uncovered and 10 minutes covered. This makes a nice chicken gravy with dumplings. If you want thicker gravy, remove dumplings and add a mix of corn starch and cold water and cook about five more minutes.

## Beech Leaf Disease

Have you ever confused Beech trees with Birch trees? I know that I usually did up until this summer. The leaves of the two species are quite similar (although the stems and leaves of the Black birch do smell like wintergreen), but their bark is the best way to differentiate them. The Beech tree has the very smooth grey bark that people have loved to carve their initials in for centuries. It doesn't really harm the tree, but it does deface it, so please do not do that. The most common birch tree we have in the Borough is the Sweet (or Black) Birch, and while its bark can also be light grey, it usually has much more prominent horizontal ridges as shown here:

an infected leaf is held up to the light.

If you want to see an example of an infected tree, there is a fairly large Beech just north of where the Woodland Trail intersects the Valley Road connector path. Many of the other Beeches along the trail are also infected. While there is presently no cure for the disease, there are a couple of treatments that can be done by a licensed arborist to protect an infected tree in the meantime. Rutgers Cooperative Extension and other agricultural research organizations are currently searching for a more permanent solution. For now, smaller trees (under 10" trunk diameter) can have their leaves sprayed multiple times during

The reason it is important to know the foregoing (if you care about trees) is that there is now a new disease moving into New Jersey from the Midwest that threatens to kill off most of our native beech trees in the next few years if nothing is done to protect them (think Dutch Elm Disease or Chestnut Blight for comparison). It is called Beech Leaf Disease because the leaves are infected by a microscopic nematode (worm) and shows up as a pattern of dark bands when

the spring and summer with a fungicide (the nematodes feed on a fungus) while larger trees can have their root flares injected with another type of fungicide which only needs to be done once every two years. While it is obviously not feasible to treat infected trees throughout a woodland area, it should be possible to selectively treat a few of the more mature trees along our Woodland Trail that we hope to preserve for future generations.

The Roosevelt Environmental Commission will be discussing what may be feasible in Roosevelt over the next couple of months. Please think about attending one of their meetings to raise questions you may have or to add your voice in support of doing what is possible to protect at least some of these beautiful native trees.

And lastly, this disease can also infect members of the European beech family such as the Copper beech, of which one of the largest in the state (and a truly magnificent specimen) is viewable just a few miles outside of town along Windsor-Perrineville Road.

You can put all of the following into your recycling bin for curbside pickup every other Wednesday morning:

- Plastic Containers – any shape container with a #1 (PET, PETE), #2 (HDPE), or a #5 (PP) label.
- Glass Containers – any food or beverage bottle (but no ceramics, dishes, glassware, lightbulbs, windows, caps or lids).
- Metal Cans - aluminum cans, tin cans, bi-metal cans, non-hazardous aerosol cans.
- Aluminum - foil, pans (try to crumble into a ball).
- Paper & Cardboard - cardboard shipping boxes (flattened), chipboard boxes, white and colored paper, junk mail, magazines, soft cover books, newspaper (including inserts).
- Please keep recyclables clean, dry, and rinse out food residue.

And remember: NO PLASTIC BAGS! KEEP ITEMS LOOSE!
